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DRAFT MINUTES FOR THE PLANNING COMMITTEE

MONDAY 16TH SEPTEMBER 2024 IN THE GUILDHALL

1. WELCOME AND APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

To receive apologies and to confirm that any absence has the approval of the Council. Cllr Bennett read out a statement about how the meeting would be conducted and recorded.

The apologies were accepted.

PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

There were no members of the public who wished to speak.

2. FORMER TOTNES CONSERVATIVE CLUB BUILDING

To receive an update on the planned works to the former Conservative Club building on Station Road.

The new owners of the former Conservative Club outlined their plans to return the building to a Victorian villa creating a family home (4-5 bed). There had been no commercial interest in the property and there has always been a residential element on the first floor of the building. Planned works include: demolishing the 1970s flat roof extensions; removing suspended ceilings on the ground floor to reveal the original features; creating a garden by taking up the tarmac car park; and potentially building a small separate dwelling within the footprint in the future. The owners have been advised to first apply for a change of use from 'Sui Generis' to Class C3 dwellinghouse, and if this is granted they would then submit the detailed listed building consent applications required for the works proposed. An invite was extended to the Committee to make a site visit if it would be helpful to do so. The Committee thanked the members of the public for their time, accepted a site visit but explained that they are unable to endorse any proposals at this stage due to predetermination of future planning applications that will come to them for comment.

The Committee reconvened Standing Orders.

5. PLANNING APPLICATIONS

5a. 2760/24/PIP - Application for permission in principle for erection of detached dwelling. Land adjacent 5 Christina Parade, Totnes.

Object. Due to lack of detailed plans the Committee is unable to offer specific comments but has concerns about the following:

- The height of the building, how it will be viewed from and the effect of its light spillage onto a natural open space and overlooking the play area;
- Impact on the scrub woodland and wildlife corridor, particularly the impact on bats.
- Poor quality scrub will provide less screening of the mass of the proposed dwelling on the top and into the bank than the woodland provides for neighbouring new dwelling built into the bank/slope.
- Access to, and lack of space in, the car park for the shop on Christina Parade during the construction phase and after.

5b. 2403/24/FUL – Extension of flat into vacant store. Brutus Centre, Unit 2 - 3 Flat 2, Fore Street, Totnes, TQ9 5RW.

Support.

5c. 2478/24/HHO – Householder application for two storey extension. Attic House, Jubilee Road, Totnes, TQ9 5BW.

Object. Overmassing/overdevelopment of the site. The loss of the existing gable end and rubble wall to timber cladding will change the visual appearance of and the character on Jubilee Road as the building abuts the road rather than being set back. The overall ridge height and monolithic design will impact on what feels like a rural setting when descending the hill.

5d. 2559/24/LBC - Listed Building consent for replacement rear windows, replacement roof windows, internal alterations & external re rendering. 10 Plymouth Road, Totnes, TQ9 5PH. Support. However, given the narrow pavements outside of the properties and existing parking on pavement issues, the Committee would request a condition that a construction management plan

is produced which takes into account the timing of construction deliveries to avoid the hours when the school run takes place.

5e. 2527/24/HHO - Householder application for alteration, extension, rear & side extension. 10 Hillbrook Road, Totnes, TQ9 5AT. Support.

5f. 2799/24/HHO - Householder application for extensions & alterations. The Gardens, Priory Avenue, Totnes, TQ9 5HR.

Support. However, the Committee would request that the tree is retained and is concerned that the use of UPVC windows is not sustainable.

5g. 2669/24/HHO – Householder application for alterations to roof and installation of rear dormer. Louan, Weirfields, Totnes TQ9 5JS.

Object. The Committee has concerns that the heights shown on the plans are insufficient to accommodate the fabric of the building and useable head height and would request that a detailed section drawing is produced. The Committee objects to the continuous rear dormer and would request that an element of pitched roof is retained to complement the surrounding street scape which is predominantly bungalows.

5h. 2428/24/HHO - Householder application for replacement of garage roof & roof lights to create garden room, reorientate front door & replace garage door with new front window. 42 Weston Lane, Totnes, TQ9 5UN.

Support. However, the Committee is concerned that the use of UPVC windows is not sustainable.

5i. 2769/24/LBC and 2770/24/FUL – Listed Building Consent for installation of Air Source Heat Pump, mounting of compressor on east corner of outer south wall of church. St John's Church, Bridgetown, Totnes, TQ9 5AB.

Comment – support in principle but more details are required on the insulation methods required for heat pump efficiency.

5j. 2585/24/LBC - Listed Building Consent for internal finishes (Phase 4). 29 High Street, Totnes, TQ9 5NP.

Support. The Committee is concerned about the use of non-breathable PIR insulation in the roof and would welcome the Heritage Officer's view.

5k. 2667/24/CLE - Certificate of lawfulness for existing use of property as a single dwellinghouse (C3). The Kingsbridge Inn, 9 Leechwell Street, Totnes, TQ9 5SY.

The Council has no evidence to support this CLE application. However, the public has raised concerns with the Council about the use and disregard of enforcement action for unlawful use.

5I. 2640/24/CLE - Certificate for lawfulness for existing use of 17c as dwellinghouse. 17C Fore Street, Totnes, TQ9 5DA.

The Council has no evidence to support this CLE application.

6. PARISH HOUSING PROFILE

 unless the data is accurate, the figures could be misleading and the town could be
 recommended for more housing building/development, and/or not of the type needed,
 than is required.

LTP4 EVIDENCE AND STRATEGY OVERVIEW

Key statistics

- Devon and Torbay have a combined population of 940,000. This is an increase of 8% in the last decade, and the highest growth of 14% was in East Devon.
- Digital access to services is reducing the need to travel, with each individual making 13% fewer trips in 2019 compared to 2002.
- Transport accounts for nearly a third of carbon emissions. 63% of which come from private cars and a third from freight.
- The majority of freight is moved by road. In Devon in 2019, there were an estimated 1.4 million HGV trips carrying 27 million tonnes of goods.
- The majority of residents of Exeter do not drive to work, including approximately a third who walk or cycle to work.

• Highest proportions of commuting by car use are typically in Torbay and in the Growth Areas.

Bus is the most common form of public transport in Devon and Torbay, with over 24 million bus trips made during 2023/24.

- Rail patronage is now 50% higher than in 2010, with over 15 million rail trips made form stations in Devon and Torbay during 2022/23.
- The number of injured in road traffic collisions in Devon and Torbay has decreased by 31% since 2013.

Asset management and road safety

Reliable and Resilient network: Continue to prioritise maintenance of A and B roads, enhance maintenance of active travel routes and parking systems.

Decarbonisation: Reduce carbon in highway maintenance and construction, through low carbon procurement, a carbon design toolkit and upgrading the streetlighting network. Greater Places for People: Work to reduce injuries to road users, with an aim of halving the number of people injured on the highway by 2030. This includes reducing speed limits on some routes to reduce collisions.

Connecting Devon and Torbay

Reliable and resilient network: Complete the rail resilience works on the Dawlish and Waterloo line, enhance the resilience of M5 J29 – J31 and explore changes to speed limits on major A roads.

Easier travel: Provide additional long-distance rail services, enhance bus and rail integration, introduce single bus branding with enhanced ticketing as well as better mobile connectivity on trains.

Decarbonisation: Support the delivery of alternative fuel stations, electric vehicle charging points and new technologies.

Exeter

Greater Places for People: Reduce dominance of vehicles within the city and support the delivery of Liveable Exeter housing developments in areas such as Water Lane, East Gate, Southgate and Red Cow.

Easier Travel: Provide a consistent standard of sustainable transport to surrounding towns, including half-hourly rail, 15-minute bus frequency as well as a comprehensive citywide cycle network.

Decarbonisation: Support roll-out of low emission vehicles, a single transport ticketing system, a shared cycle hire scheme and the testing of new measures and/or network changes.

Torbay

Greater Places for People: Revitalise the public realm spaces in the town centres and improve access to transport interchanges.

Easier Travel: Construct a new railway station at Edginswell with links to Bristol, Exeter, and London, roll-out zero emission buses with enhanced bus stop access and facilities, and offer shared cars and bicycles for hire.

Places to be Naturally Active: Improve the Bay Trails network for local travel as well as the connections to the Devon multi-use trail network.

Growth Areas

Unlock Development: Deliver and enhance transport links to enable sustainable strategic development.

Easier Travel: Provide more frequent and attractive bus and rail services, with faster journeys and cleaner vehicles. Includes aspiration for half-hourly trains on the Tarka Line. Greater place for People: Enhance town centres through reducing the dominance of vehicles and improving public realm, and progress delivery of LCWIP priorities including the Teign

Estuary and Tarka Trails.

Rural Devon, Market & Coastal Towns

The Place to be Naturally Active: Expand the multi-use trail network, delivery of local priorities for 'green lanes' and 20mph communities.

Easier Travel: Enhance and expand bus and rail integration by providing hub-and-ride services, establishing new stations, improving connections between buses and trains, and upgrading bus stop facilities for long-distance services.

Decarbonisation: Deliver Electric Vehicle charging points, decarbonise rural transport fleets, and improve digital access and online services in rural areas

ACTION PLAN

The draft LTP4 is a long-term strategy, accompanied by an action plan of measures. An indication of priorities for different methods of travel is shown below:

- Expansion of Multi-use trail network, including completion of Tarka Trail and Drakes Trail and progressing Teign Estuary and Clyst Valley Trails
- Green lanes to deliver local priorities for walking, cycling and horse-riding
- Active Exeter: 50% of trips in the city to be made by walking and cycling
- Delivery of Bay Trails and Newton Abbot to Torbay Cycle route
- Delivery of priorities in Growth area LCWIP's
- Continued delivery of Devon Metro, including increased frequency from Exeter to East Devon, Barnstaple and 15-minute frequency to Digby & Sowton
- New stations at Cullompton, Edginswell, Monkerton and Okehampton East
- Reinstate railway from Tavistock to Plymouth
- Resilience works at Dawlish and enhanced diversionary capacity of Waterloo Line
- Increased services to London from Torbay and Okehampton/Barnstaple
- Bus priority measures in Exeter and Barnstaple
- Roll out of modern low emission buses throughout Torbay, Exeter and Barnstaple
- Bus/rail Interchange at Polsloe Bridge and Digby Park and Ride
- 15-minute frequency bus services between Exeter and surrounding towns
- New bus services from Torbay to East of Exeter
- Completion of North Devon Link Road and A382 enhancements
- Sherford Southern Access Route
- Dinan Way Extension
- Improve resilience of M5 between J29 J31
- Trial reduced speed limits on strategic routes

- Low Carbon Procurement Strategy
- Develop Low Carbon Design Toolkit
- Electric vehicle charge points and promote Peer to Peer charging

Background

The requirement for Local Authorities to produce LCWIPs is set out in the Government's Cycling and Walking Investment Strategy. Developing an LCWIP follows a consistent process to identify cycling and walking improvements required at a local level. It also strengthens Devon County Council's bid for future funding and ensure improvements can be incorporated into future development plans.

Devon County Council has three existing LCWIPs already adopted and two more in development:

- Exeter LCWIP
- Heart of Teignbridge LCWIP
- Barnstaple with Bideford and Northam LCWIP
- Cullompton and Tiverton LCWIP (in development)
- Clyst Valley and New Communities LCWIP (in development)

The Countywide LCWIP will complement these existing LCWIPs, identifying routes between settlements. It develops upon the existing Multi-Use Trail (MUT) Strategy to identify potential high-level routes for connecting market towns and smaller communities across the

county. This will help to inform active travel's place in the emerging Devon and Torbay Local Transport Plan 4 (LTP) and will be one of the key documents feeding into its development.

The objectives of the Devon Countywide LCWIP are:

- To provide an aspirational long-term strategic network plan for walking and cycling links between Devon's towns and communities.
- To use evidence of existing and potential future demand to plan and design interventions which will:
 - o support the health and wellbeing of all users
 - o improve accessibility and social sustainability
 - o accommodate growth
 - o deliver economic benefits
 - respond to climate change
- To design a prioritised programme of infrastructure interventions and improvements for future investment, considering existing plans, strategies, and priorities across the county.
- To make the case to Government for future funding for strategic walking and cycling infrastructure outside of urban contexts, ensuring investment is targeted where it can have the greatest impact.

The LCWIP has followed the Department for Transport's 6 stage process:

Stage 1 – Determine the Scope. Establish the geographical context and arrangements for governing and preparing the plan.

Stage 2 – Gathering Information. Identify existing walking and cycling patterns and potential new journeys. Review existing conditions and identify barriers to walking and cycling. Review related transport and land use policies and programmes.

Stage 3 & 4 – Network planning for cycling & walking. Identify origin and destination points and cycle flows. Convert flows into a potential network of routes which complement and build upon the existing Devon MUT Strategy and determine the improvements required.

Stage 5- Prioritising improvements. Prioritise improvements to develop a phased programme for future investment.

Stage 6 – Integration and application. Integrate outputs into local planning and transport policies, strategies, and delivery plans.

The Countywide LCWIP has been developed in accordance with this guidance using a bespoke Geographic Information System (GIS) computer model.

Proposed Routes

Following the identification of key desire lines, 10 routes for improvement are proposed as part of the LCWIP. This aims to focus investment on corridors identified as having high

demand or are forecasted to have high potential for active travel. The LCWIP does not include detailed plans for every route or identify every aspiration for active travel improvements across the county. The routes are set out in an east-to-west order, relative to their geography.

Scheme Prioritisation

Funding for active travel schemes and infrastructure is typically awarded from the Government and in many cases, it requires Local Authorities to bid for this funding. Therefore, it is important that a set of schemes are identified ahead of the bidding process.

Stage 5 of the LCWIP process involves prioritising the routes developed in previous stages and collating a delivery plan. This can be used later to target funding bid to schemes higher in the delivery plan.

While the prioritisation exercise focuses on entire routes, it is important to note that this is flexible and should be adapted, for example if funding becomes available but is only sufficient to deliver sections of routes. Equally, funding may become available which is only suitable for particular routes, or may be as a result of developer funding. In these cases, lower priority schemes may be delivered if they are more appropriate.

The 10 routes identified in this LCWIP have been scored against several criteria, which are detailed in the full document on page 28, resulting in the routes being prioritised as follows:

Route 9: Sidbury to Sidford

Medium Term

Route 3: Clearbrook to Roborough

Route 7: Teign Estuary Trail

Route 1: Tark Trail (Knowle to Willingcott)

Longer Terms

Route 5: Ashburton to Buckfastleigh

Route 2: Ruby Way (Holsworthy to Hatherleigh)

Route 8: Otter Trail

Route 4: Yealmpton to Newton Ferrers

Route 6: Boniface Trail

Route 10: Beer to Axminster and Uplyme

ITEM 7 – SOUTH HAMS DISTRICT COUNCIL LOCAL CYCLING AND WALKING INFRASTRUCTURE PLAN (LCWIP) CONSULTATION

South Hams District Council and West Devon Borough Council are developing a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP).

An LCWIP allows local authorities to help plan long-term networks and routes for everyday walking, wheeling and cycling. Wheeling means those using wheelchairs and other wheeled mobility aids.

An LCWIP aims to create:

- A network plan of high priority walking and cycling routes
- A prioritised list of projects to improve walking and cycling infrastructure
- Reports which summarise the analysis that has been undertaken to identify the priority walking and cycling routes and how potential improvements have been identified

An LCWIP is important to help residents to become more active by walking and cycling.

What are the routes, and how are they selected?

Potential walking and cycling routes across the South Hams and West Devon have been identified through a complex modelling process.

The LCWIP can only include existing roads and cycle paths, and cannot assess or suggest cycle paths that pass over private land.

The identified routes have been split into two types:

- Routes completely within a single town known an an intra-urban route
- A route connecting two or more communities known as an inter-urban route

As well as identifying routes, the modelling process has also identified further possible improvements for cycling, walking, and "wheeling" in the South West Devon area.

There are **no proposed schemes with funding** at this stage. However, these schemes could be pursued if funding becomes available.

There may be many more routes outside of the LCWIP that are also important to residents, but the project currently focuses on those routes shown to have the greatest number of people who would use them.

What are the barriers to people walking and cycling?

 Heavily trafficked main roads, with limited provision for active travel, and limited crossing points

- Dangerous junctions for walking and cycling
- One-way streets and other features in our communities that make it difficult to make short journeys by bicycle
- Features of the natural landscape such as steep hills and rivers
- Poor surfaces and drainage on existing routes
- Existing roads and routes being too narrow
- Barriers such as chicane barriers or 'A frames'
- Obstacles like vehicles parked on pavements

What is being done to reduce or remove these barriers to cycling and walking? Each route on the LCWIP has been analysed to identify what barriers may stop people walking or cycling - and solutions have been suggested in the plan to overcome these barriers and provide an 'appropriate level of service' to enable more people to walk, wheel or cycle along each route.

Where appropriate, interventions align with the Department for Transport's Local Transport Note 1/20 Cycle Infrastructure Design and other national guidance.

What happens after the public consultation?

After the consultation ends, we will produce a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan, which will form the basis for long-term investment in walking and cycling in the South Hams and West Devon.

When funding is secured for design and delivery of some quicker wins and early projects, your comments will feed into the early stages of design development, so that those designs address local problems and provide adequate solutions to help more people to walk and cycle more often.

ITEM 8 - BOWDEN PILLARS WOODLAND CREATION

Totnes Town Council has received the email below from the Forestry Commission:

We [Forestry Commission] are currently assessing a woodland creation scheme located at Bowden Pillars Farm, located above Totnes, which is being funded as part of English Woodland Creation Offer (EWCO).

As this scheme is likely to cause some landscape change and is highly visible from the centre of Totnes, we felt it was pertinent to consult with local community groups and councils to get their opinion on the scheme.

The scheme will be made up of a mixture of planted native broadleaf areas and areas of native broadleaves established through natural colonisation (i.e. areas left ungrazed and trees allowed to naturally regenerate from nearby seed trees). Open space has been integrated into the scheme to retain views on site and soften the design.

Existing public access routes will be maintained, and new permissive access will be included within the scheme
